Shri Niketan Bahuuddeshiya Sanstha, Nagpur (SNBS) was established in the year 1991 by Hon. Secretary Shri. Shripad A. Gandhe. Shri Niketan Arts Commerce College was started in the year 2001. It is a grant-in-aid college affiliated to Rashtrasant Tukadoji Maharaj Nagpur University. It had a humble beginning with small number of students and has a strength of 440 students now. The college offers degree courses in Bachelor of Commerce and Bachelor of Arts. In Arts faculty, students have ample choice to choose the optional subjects. B.Com programme is available in all the three languages- Marathi, English and Hindi. B.A programme has two medium i.e. Marathi and Hindi. The institution is registered under All India Survey of Higher Education (AISHE) by MHRD and Management Information System (MIS) of the government of Maharashtra. The college takes the permission for additional admissions after regular intake in granted section. The college gives the benefit of government scholarships and freeships to the students. Recently the institution has applied for 2(f) under the UGC Act 1956.

Hon. Ravindra Bijawe and Hon. Secretary Shripad Gandhe are the guiding force of the institution. Since its establishment, the college has been offering education to economically backward classes. The college takes consistent efforts for an all-round development of the students and it is committed to the cause of quality education. All the departments of the college conducts varied programmes to equip students for the challenges of new era. To make the students self-reliant and confident, college organises different workshops, guest lectures and academic and extracurricular activities. The college encourages bright students by providing them a set of books for a year under the book bank scheme. The qualified, experienced and dedicated faculties work tirelessly to impart knowledge, values and ethics among the students and make them self-sufficient for the better future.

Criterion I-Curricular aspects

The college is affiliated to R.T.M Nagpur University, Nagpur. The institution offers two programmes B.Com

and B.A in UG. Both the programmes are elective. Institution offers ample choice to select the subjects in B.A and B.Com programmes. The institution has a forceful mechanism for dissemination of course content. As college is affiliated to RTMNU, the institution strictly follows the curriculum, designed by the University. In the beginning of the session, action plan is prepared by the teachers for an effective curriculum delivery. All the faculty members prepare teaching plan and submit it to the principal. Teachers sternly adheres to annual, monthly and daily teaching plan.

Some of the faculty members have prominent representation on various university bodies and committees. Principal Dr. Shribala Deshpande is the member of BOS and RRC of Home Economics department in the university. Two teachers are the members of BOS in Nagpur University. Some teachers have contributed in curriculum designing of the university as well. Dr. Gulhane Head Department of Commerce held a position in the university as a senate member from 2011-2016. All the teachers contribute in evaluation and moderation process of university question papers.

Last year the institution has conducted four certificate courses (30 hrs) apart from two regular programmes. Some skill development courses of short duration are also arranged by the college. Department of Home Economics organise various workshops like mehendi course, cake and icing, phenyl making, rangoli making, bouquet making which encourages the entrepreneurial skills in students.

The institution conducts co-curricular as well as extra-curricular activities for all-round development of the students. The college has arranged various programmes to sensitize the students about different social issues. Institution integrates crosscutting issues human values and environment and sustainability with the prescribed syllabus. Students undertake the internships or subject related field projects under the guidance of concerned teachers. To improve the quality of education, the institution takes feedback from students and analyse the data to present the report to the principal.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

Criterion II- Teaching–Learning and Evaluation

The institution mostly has the admissions of economically backward and marginalised students. The college has admissions of educationally deprived students. The average enrolment is 63.8% while average percentage of students admitted from reserved category of last five years is 81.6%. The institution has recruited 80% posts against sanctioned posts, out of which 69% staff is Ph.D holder. The student-teacher ratio of the current year is 25:38. The college has mentorship programme which enhance the existing knowledge and skills of the students. The ratio of mentor to students for the latest academic year is 25:38.

The learning levels of the students are assessed at various levels. The aggregate percentage of marks in the qualifying examination shows the learner's aptitude. Teachers identify slow learners and fast learners at the entry level. Bridge programmes are arranged to fill up the gaps. The students from different backgrounds have diverse learning levels. Slow learners are guided in the free hours while advanced learners are given home assignments to enhance their learning skills. The competent and qualified teachers in their respective subject employ different techniques to impart knowledge. The institution has dynamic mechanism for teaching learning process. To enhance the learning experiences, various teaching methodologies are used in the classroom teaching.

To make the learning experience joyful, the institution encourages for innovation and creativity in teaching process. Apart from conventional teaching methods 31% teachers make use of ICT for effective teaching. The institution stimulates active participation of the students by organising guest lectures, group discussions, class seminars, projects and field visits etc. Teachers attend various seminars, workshops, conferences to keep themselves updated.

To assess the growth of learners, the institution has its Continuous Internal Evaluation System (CIE). The internal evaluation method of the institution includes unit test, surprise test, midterm exams, assignments and viva-voce. Practical examination (Home Economics) is conducted as per the university guidelines. To bring about the all-round development of the students, teachers motivate them to participate in co-curricular as well as extra-curricular activities. Programme outcomes, programme specific outcomes are uploaded on the website of institution.

Research, Innovations and Extension

Criterion III- Research, Innovations and Extension

The institution doesn't received any grants from government and non-government agencies for the research projects. Recently Commerce department submitted the minor research project to the Government the approval is yet to come. Three teachers of the institution are recognised as a research supervisors. Under their eminent guidance 7 scholars have been awarded the Ph.D degrees in their relative subjects. All the teachers publish the research papers in various national or international journals. All the staff members attend conferences, workshops and seminars of their respective subjects and present the research papers in it. The faculty members have published 8 books on various subjects with ISBN. Some teachers contributed chapters in the books. Teachers have contributed in designing the prescribed university text books for UG courses. Total 23 research papers are published in the journals notified on UGC website. 129 research papers by the teachers have been published in national/ international conference proceedings and journals.

Principal Dr. Deshpande is a recipient of 'Best teacher award', 'Vidarbha Bhushan Award', 'Ideal Teacher award', 'Rashtrapita Mahatma Gandhi state level deaddiction Award' and 'Bhartiya Dalit Sahitya Akademi Virangana Savitribai Phule Fellowship Award'. Three teachers of the institution are also honoured with prestigious awards in different categories

The institution focuses on social, physical and spiritual growth of the students. The institution organises various programmes in the neighbourhood community to sensitize the students about different social issues. The college organises various outreach programmes like cleanliness drives, Aids rally, gender equity programmes, sickle cell, de-addiction programme, blood donation camp, dental and eye check-up camp, breast cancer programmes etc. The institution promotes various government schemes like Digital Literacy, Swaccha Bharat, and Say no to Plastic by organising programmes. The institution has organised the workshop 'Empowerment of Girls' for girl students.

The institution has functional MOU's with Santaji Mahavidyalaya, Womens College and C P and Berar Mahavidyalaya for student exchange. The MOU with Godavari Multistate Urban Credit Cooperative Society and MCED, Maharashtra Centre for Entrepreneurship development, Aurangabad (M.S) for internship and exchange of knowledge. Linkages are with Shivam Food Products for experiential learning.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

Criterion IV- Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The college does not have its own building so it is run in the rented campus. Ganesh Nagar Kanya Vidyalaya and our college share the same building. The school is held in the afternoon shift. The college has the morning shift. There are total 9 classrooms, out of which 1 classroom is ITC enabled. Teachers make frequent use of this facility to make the teaching learning process interesting. The college has Home-Economics Laboratory, Staff room and girls Common Room. Library and administrative office is upgraded with Wi-Fi facility with high speed connectivity. The institution takes the support of computer laboratory of Ganesh Nagar Kanya Vidyalaya to provide IT facility to the students. The library is enriched with books, reference books, magazines, dictionaries, encyclopaedia and journals. The college library has total 6178 books while 32 magazines and journals have been subscribed for students and teachers. The library has a membership of N list, and LIBMAN which provides the access to e-resources. The institution has no adequate facilities for sports. But the institution has done the provision of the playground by signing MOU with Vidarbha Krida Mandal. Students do the practice in the ground of Vidarbha Krida Mandal.

Newspapers in Marathi, Hindi and English are available for the students as well as teachers. Average annual expenditure on purchase of books and journals/e- journals during the last five years is 99000/-. Average library footfalls are 7 per day. Pure drinking water is provided through RO. Procedure of students admission is automated under Mastersoft ERP. Three CCTV cameras are installed in the campus to maintain security and safety. The institution hires the local agencies for maintaining physical and academic support facilities.

Student Support and Progression

Criterion V- Student support and progression

The institution has an active student support and progression mechanism. The college has Anti-ragging cell, Mahila Takrar Niwaran Samiti (womens cell), Grievance Redressal Cell and Career Guidance Cell. students' council. University representative (UR) is selected as per the guidelines of the university.

The college provides the various government scholarships to the students. **Average percentage of students benefited by scholarships and freeships provided by the Government is 30.02.** Capacity building and skill enhancement programmes are carried out by Commerce, English, Physical education department, Hindi and Marathi department. These departments have organised programmes on ICT computing skills, life skills and language and communication skills. Many students from both the programmes pursue higher studies after their graduation. Our 2 students have completed C.A while 1 student has been awarded Ph.D.

Career Counselling Cell organises various exams on the college level like pradhnya shodh, Gyanprabodhini, Gyanvrudhdi spardha to enable the students to crack the competitive exams. The college library provides different books on competitive exams. Career guidance cell organises various guest lectures to guide the students regarding competitive exams and the opportunities in different sectors. The incharge of the cell guide the students for various entrance exams (MBA, B.Ed) as well. Some of the students are placed in the police force, army and in the government sector. **Average percentage of students benefitted by guidance for competitive examinations and career counselling offered by the Institution is 27.24.** Average percentage of placement of outgoing students is 13.18

The college has active NSS unit which organises various programmes for neighbourhood community. Student's active participation in all the programmes promote their representation in all the extra-curricular and co-curricular activities. Different cultural events and intercollegiate competitions are arranged by the college every year. Many students represent the college in various intercollegiate competitions arranged by other institutions and have bagged the prizes also. These competitions definitely give an opportunity to the students to showcase their skills.

Governance, Leadership and Management

Criterion VI - Governance, Leadership and Management

Shri Niketan Arts Commerce College is established in the year 2001. The governing body of the college is keen to impart quality education to the students. The vision and mission of the college is to bring about all round development of the students. The institution takes all efforts to empower students to meet the challenges of the 21st century. The institution has participative management mechanism to accomplish its vision and mission. As per Maharashtra Universities Act 2016, college has constituted CDC in which members discuss the future plan and decides the various activities for enhancing the quality of education. The institution has decentralisation and participative management mechanism to conduct the various academic and extracurricular programme in the college under the leadership of the principal. The IQAC is functional since 2017. All the activities carried out in the college are reviewed by IQAC and gives suggestion to improvise the teaching-learning activities.

The college has many committees for good governance. The principal guides, motivates and monitors all the activities. The in charge /coordinators of different committees arrange guest lectures, different competitions. Teachers attend the faculty development programmes regularly. Average percentage of teachers undergoing online, face to face faculty development programmes is 53.46. All the teachers submit self-appraisal forms and annual reports of their department at the end of the session which states their contribution to the academic development of the students and the expansion of their department. Principal check the reports and discuss the progress of the department. The teaching learning process is constantly monitored and innovative techniques are implemented by the faculty members.

Institutional Values and Best Practices

Criterion VII – Institutional Values and Best Practices

The institution has co-education so it promote Gender Equity programs to educate girls about their rights at home, at work, and in the society. The institution has counselling cell as well as women's cell for the welfare of the students. The college shows gender sensitivity by providing common room facility to girl students. Institution has conducted workshops of BJS to empower girls. In this workshop girls are given the training of martial art. Many programmes are arranged on gender equity in last five years like Beti Bachao Beti Padhao, Pori Jara Japun. The institution has developed the system to manage solid waste and e-waste. The college takes effort to lessen the use of plastic and encourage the students to use the cloth bags. The NSS department of the college organises plantation programmes. Environment day is celebrated by doing the plantation in the nearby area.

The college takes initiatives to inculcate human values, ethics and principles of tolerance and harmony among students. 'Constitution Day' and 'Voters day' are also celebrated to make the students aware of their rights,

responsibilities and duties. The code of conduct for teachers and students are displayed on the website of the institution. The college celebrates national and international commemorative days to instil patriotism, brotherhood and humanity among students and staff members. Cultural department organises events and festivals for the all-round development of the students. The Swapna- Samidha Cell organises birth and death anniversaries of great leaders and saints to make the students aware of their deeds and ideologies. The institution has conducted rakhi making programmes in which students have made rakhis and sent for the soldiers through 'Prahar'.

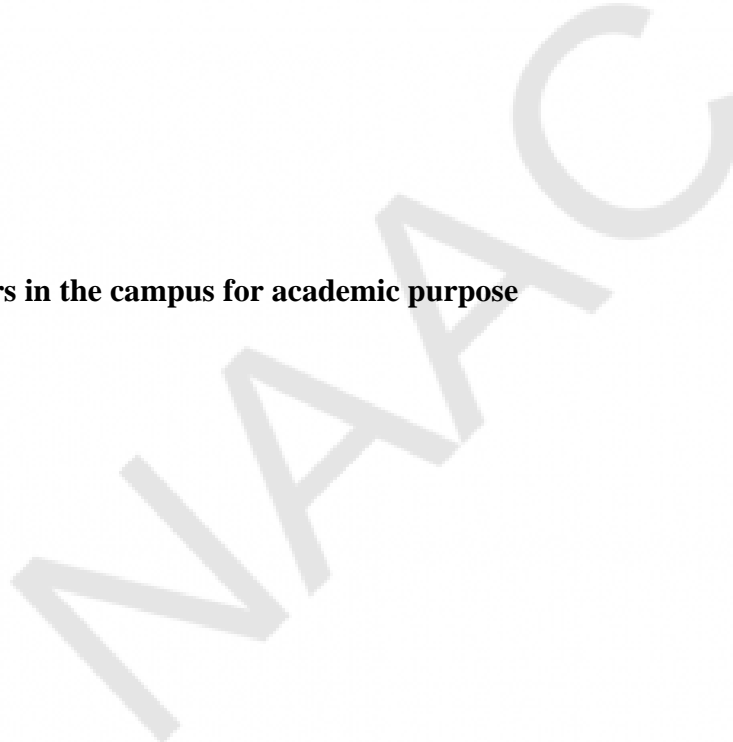

4. Quality Indicator Framework(QIF)

1.1 Curricular Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 The Institution ensures effective curriculum delivery through a well planned and documented process

Response:

The college has two programmes B.Com and B.A. Both the programmes has elective. In B.A programme students have ample choice to choose the optional subjects. The college is affiliated to R.T.M. Nagpur University. The detailed study of prescribed curriculum is done in the beginning of the session by all the departments with HOD's. The curriculum is designed by the university and it is strictly followed by the college for the effective curriculum delivery. The availability of periods in proportion with the syllabus content is viewed by every subject teacher. The management of the available periods and the prescribed teaching contents are taken care while preparing a teaching plan. After the commencement of the academic session every teacher prepares the Annual Teaching Plan considering the academic calendar of the college. Annual planning comprises the syllabus which has to be taught throughout the year. Monthly planning as well as daily planning is prepared and followed. Time Table is prepared according to the norms and displayed it on the notice board. This action plan helps to engage the theory classes as well as practical periods according to the university directions. Though the faculty members strictly adhere to the planning done by them, but they have freedom of reshuffling the contents to keep the pace with the student's ability. The Head of the department allocates the subjects to the colleagues according to their specialization.

For the effective teaching, different student centric methods are adopted. Question-answer method, lecture method, group discussion, seminar methods are used for the effective teaching. Power point presentations and audio-visual aids are vital facets to survive in this technocratic world so the teachers make use of it in the class room teaching. We are committed for the all-round development of the students so, different activities are conducted in the class as well as on the college level.

Other than the above mentioned methods, college organises educational visits, guest-lectures, and varied competitions. The college library has different reference books, magazines, periodicals, dictionaries and prescribed textbooks which are easily available for the students. The book bank facility is available for the poor and meritorious students.

The college encourages the teachers to join the faculty development programmes to improve the teaching skills and upgrade their knowledge.

To assess the students' knowledge two unit tests in the each session are conducted. Model tests are taken at the end of the each academic session. To improve the quality of education, the institution takes regular feedback from students and analyse the data. The report of feedback is submitted to the principal.

1.1.2 The institution adheres to the academic calendar including for the conduct of CIE

Response:

In the beginning of the academic session committee prepare an Annual Academic Calendar under the guidance of Principal. HOD of all the departments prepare the list of the events to be taken throughout the year. The academic calendar is prepared before the commencement of academic session. It is a guide line to plan the co-curricular and extra-curricular activities which is observed by all the faculty members. In the month of June, under the guidance of Principal, academic planning is done. All the teachers prepare teaching-plans individually and submit it to the principal. It comprises of syllabus contents and departmental activities. All the subject has theory for 80 marks and internal assessment carries 20 marks. Home economics has 50 marks for theory and 50 marks for practical exam.

The coordinators of extracurricular and co-curricular activities make a plan of all the programmes to be conducted throughout the year and submit it to the Principal. Academic calendar committee collects departmental planning and prepares the academic calendar of the college.

The Academic Calendar has the teaching program, holidays, and details of the extra-curricular activities, schedule of the unit tests, prelim examinations and internal evaluation. Internal evaluation is done through viva-voce, assignments, group discussion. Answer sheets are assessed and suggestions are given to the students.

2.2 Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 The institution assesses the learning levels of the students and organises special Programmes for advanced learners and slow learners

Response:

The capability of the admitted students is assessed at various levels. The aggregate percentages of marks in the qualifying examination show the learner's aptitude. The members of the admission committee measure the ability of the students at the entry level. The subject teachers try to judge his/her performance from their last examination score in the concerned subject. At the time of admission they are instructed about the course contents and examination pattern. In the orientation programme, concerned teachers update the students regarding the programmes they have chosen. In the beginning teachers try to evaluate student's skill by engaging them in the various class activities. The faculty members employ different tools to measure the capacity of various students who have come from varied backgrounds. We have the measure flow from rural background so maximum students lagged behind in this competitive world.

The learner's potential is assessed through unit tests, group discussions, exercises and small class activities. The teachers come to know the slow learners and advanced learners from their overall performance in the college. Teachers guide the slow learner in the free hours to enhance their abilities and encourage them to put more efforts. The slow learners are given questions to practice. The advanced learners are motivated to improve overall performance by guiding them. They are given the homework and problems to solve at home. They are encouraged to attend the classes regularly and to participate in all the activities. The subject notes, question banks, useful reading material are provided to them for better performance

2.3 Teaching- Learning Process

2.3.1 Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences

Response:

Student is the centre of the teaching learning process. To make the process pleasurable and student centric, teachers of the institution employ different techniques. To enhance the learning experiences, different methodologies are being used by the teachers of the institution which broadly promotes independence and learner autonomy.

In keeping view with the goals of education, teachers of the institution plan their teaching accordingly. In this technocratic era different teaching aids used by the teachers of the institution to impart knowledge among students effectively. Teachers work tirelessly to create conducive environment for the students. Teachers recognise the students interest, their capability to comprehend and plan their teaching by adopting different methods.

Different activities are planned wherein the learners are the main focus. Most of the time teachers play a peripheral role in most of the activities.

- Group discussions, projects, seminars, educational tours are arranged to get the empirical knowledge. These activities make the learning process interesting and easy. Students are encouraged to participate in the discussions and voice their experiences or views in such programmes.
- Educational visits, field-trips, workshops, training programmes are organised to increase the practical knowledge of the students. The institution stimulates active participation of the students in organising various programmes and competitions which develops managerial skills among them. By organising exhibitions, guest lectures and encouraging the students to participate in academic competitions teachers boost the collaborative learning.
- Interaction with the students, group discussion, doubt clearing in additional contact hours are varied strategies used for problem solving.
- Wide-ranging reference books, magazines, journals, periodicals, newspapers INFLIBNET-N-LIST (97000 e-books+7000 e-journals), English, Marathi and Hindi literature are vastly used by the students and teachers to enhance their teaching learning experience. Students make use of these resources to make presentations, charts, speeches and to write the columns in the newspapers or bulletin.
- Occasionally teaching is done with the help of LCD, slide shares, films, and video clips.
- Students are motivated to participate in intercollegiate competitions, sports events and extra-curricular activities in large numbers. Students learn interactive-skills, team spirit, by participating in varied programmes.
- Home-Economics Department of the institution organises the different workshops like- spices making, detergent making and phenyl making, Bandhani workshop and Mehendi workshop to develop the employability skills.
- To motivate the students for self- employment, institution arranges workshops, guest-lectures and training programmes for eg. File-making, Envelop making, Lantern making etc.
- Students have easy access to the teacher to get their queries solved. They can discuss the varied issues with concerned teachers freely to satisfy their problems.

We have adopted the recent changes introduced by R.T.M. Nagpur University from the session 2016-17. The internal assessment and semester system has been introduced by the University in the same year. Being an affiliated college we follow the directions of the university.

The internal assessment is transparent and robust. During the induction programme students are briefed about internal assessment structure. All the faculty members give detail information about the internal assessment and practical exam. We adopt formative as well as summative assessment to evaluate teaching-learning process. The internal evaluation is done on the basis of unit tests, surprise tests, seminars, group discussion, attendance, assignments and overall academic performance. The marks obtained in the unit tests and class tests are communicated to the students to improve their performance. 2.5.2 Mechanism to deal with internal examination related grievances is transparent, time- bound and efficient

Response:

The college follows the examination norms decided by the University as our college is affiliated to R.T.M. Nagpur University. The grievances/doubts regarding the internal assessment are dealt with patience by the faculty members or examination committee. If students have any doubt about the internal marks they can meet HOD. The faculty members pay attention to resolve the queries and satisfy them. If they are not contented they are free to meet the Principal personally.

The University examinations are under the governance of University. The grievances about the University Examination are redressed with the assistance of grievance cell of the University and Examination Board.

- After the declaration of University results students can apply for verification of marks/ doubts within 12 days.
- To satisfy their doubts students can ask for the photo-copy of their assessed answer sheet from the university. After receiving the photo-copy students can seek the opinion of the concerned teachers.
- If the student is not satisfied with the preliminary evaluation then he can put it for the re-valuation by following the University directions.
- The administrative staff of the college helps them to communicate their problems with the University.
- The students and parents can meet the Principal/HOD's and discuss the problems freely to find out the solution.
- The request of re-valuation is considered by the university and verified results are declared within stipulated period.

2.6 Student Performance and Learning Outcomes

3.3 Extension Activities

3.3.1 Extension activities are carried out in the neighborhood community, sensitizing students to social issues, for their holistic development, and impact thereof during the last five years.

Response:

The focus of the institution is to bring the social, physical and spiritual growth of the students. To integrate these values, institute organises various programmes which sensitize the students to numerous social issues and to the problems of neighbourhood community. Students have collected the data and analysed it. Students have understood that the addiction has affected their body and ruined them mentally, emotionally and physically.
- According to the State Government's directions, programmes on '**Vittiya Saksharta Abhiyaan**' (Cashless India) are organised for the neighbourhood community as well as for the college students in the Session 2016-17. Guest lecture and Rally are arranged on 'Cashless India.' Teachers and students have taught the digital payments, cashless transactions to the students of Junior colleges in our nearby areas. Our students have encouraged the people and the young students to use e-payments for transparent dealings. Students have taught cashless transactions to the small shopkeepers of nearby areas. Students and teachers have explained the importance of cashless transaction to make modern India.
- The NSS Department of the institution has arranged the programme on '**Sickle Cell Anaemia**' in the session 2017-18 in collaboration with Indira Gandhi Government Medical College, Nagpur. In this drive, the team of doctors enlighten the students of our institution as well as the girl students of Ganesh Nagar Kanya Mahavidyalaya about this disease. After an introductory lecture, free check-up is carried out. The affected students are asked to come to the hospital for further investigation and for the future treatment. Affected students have taken treatment to improve their health. Teachers and students have worked hard to make it success.
- In the session 2018-19 '**Free Dental Check-up Camp**' is organised by Commerce Department for the local community. The team of doctors examine the oral health and suggested the treatment. The students of our institution, the students of Ganesh Nagar Kanya Mahavidyalaya and people from

neighbourhood area participated in it.

- Commerce and English Department have organised ‘**Cervical Cancer Mass Awakening Programme**’ on Thursday, 17th October 2019 Dr. Pragati Khalatkar, the renowned doctor of the city has guided the audience on the occasion. 4.1 Physical Facilities

4.1.1 The Institution has adequate infrastructure and physical facilities for teaching- learning. viz., classrooms, laboratories, computing equipment etc.

Response:

The college does not have its own building so it is run in the rented campus. The institution has two programmes i.e Commerce and Arts. The institute has classrooms, library, Home-Economics laboratory, Computer laboratory, Sports room, Staff room and Common room for girl students. There are 9 classrooms out of which one classroom is LCD enabled. The college library has total 6178 books while 32 magazines and journals are also available for students and teachers. To Calculate the footfalls and number of users, librarian maintain the register. One computer and printer is provided to the librarian, one computer for the library attendant and 3 computers are installed for students and teacher's access. There are 10 computers in the computer lab which are available for the students for academic purpose. 4 computers are available for teaching staff with 2 printers. 3 computers are installed in the administrative office which are in LAN and are attached to one printer. 2 xerox machines are available in the college one is in the administrative office and other one is installed in the library. Wi-Fi facility is available in the library and office. Teachers make use of their android phones to make the teaching learning activity interesting.

4.1.2 The Institution has adequate facilities for cultural activities, sports, games (indoor, outdoor), gymnasium, yoga centre etc.

Response:

The institution has a full time physical education director. But the college does not have adequate facilities for sports. The college has no play ground on which indoor or outdoor games are played. Students can not avail the facility of gymnasium or yoga centre or yoga room due to inadequate space. But the institution has taken care of university players by allowing them to do the practice on the ground of Vidarbha Krida Mandal. The institution has signed MOU with Vidarbha Krida Mandal. The students who play kho-kho, Kabbadi and Athletics go to this ground regularly for the practice under the supervision of our HOD Physical Dept. Mr. Prashant Khalatkar. Our college student Lokesh Bhandwalkar has done the practice on this ground and got selected in the kho-kho team of Maharashtra for three consecutive years 2017-18, 2018-19 and 2019-20. He won the Gold Medal in **Khelo India Khelo**. Many students have got selected in the university kho-kho team as well as for cross-country. Physical education department celebrates Sports Day every year by arranging guest lectures on games/sports and mental health. Yoga Day is also celebrated for college students and teachers in our ground. Last year yoga workshop was taken for teaching staff for 8 days. Every year college organises the cultural activities in the Annual Gathering on the college level. These activities are conducted in the rented hall where students showcase their hidden talents. Prizes are given to the winners. Utkarsha Bhasha Mandal organises intercollegiate essay competition, elocution competition which is held in the hall.

The administrative body comprises of vice-president, secretary, treasurer, three members, principal and the representatives of the teaching and non-teaching staff.

According to the Maharashtra Universities Act 1994, institution had constituted Local Management Committee (LMC). In the statutory body, apart from the governing structure, there were three teacher representatives elected by the staff members and one member was elected from non-teaching staff. It helped to take the major decisions for the successful functioning of the college.

In the year 2016 College Development Committee has been introduced by the university. As per Maharashtra Universities Act 2016, college has constituted CDC which has a President and Secretary at the top. The four members from education, industry, social work and a member from alumni have been taken in the CDC. The committee consists one Head of the department who is nominated by principal, IQAC Coordinator, three teacher representatives who are elected by staff members and one member is elected from non-teaching staff. The principal works as the member secretary of the governing body. In the CDC meeting, members discuss the future plan and decides the various activities for enhancing the quality of education.

Committee in-charge with its members discuss the plan with principal and staff members in the formal meeting. The number of exams to be conducted and its tentative dates, viva voce schedule have been discussed and decided in the meeting. The nature of 4 Unit test and 2 Test exams have been decided in the meetings only. The in-charge gives budget for conducting the exams. The First and Second Unit Tests are conducted in the first semester while Third and Fourth Unit Tests are conducted in the second semester. Notices and time tables are displayed time to time on the notice board for the students as well as for the teachers. Two terminal exams are conducted at the end of the semesters. Teachers of the respective subjects submit the question papers to the exam department before 15 days of its commencement. Teachers help and cooperate exam department by following its duty chart. Teachers collect their answer sheets from the exam department for the assessment and distribute the corrected answer sheets to the students.

Intended outcome: Exam department execute its plan successfully with the participation of teachers, non-teaching staff members. Decentralisation and participative management is the key to make the event successful as one cannot work in isolation.

Impact: The institution conduct all the exams on time. Students are benefitted by attempting the college exams as they come to know the pattern of university exam and question papers. students are required to study regularly as they have to appear in the college exams. These exams boost their morale and confidence. Many students get distinction and high scores in the University exams.

In this way institution practises the decentralisation and participative management to conduct the various programmes and activities successfully.

In the college CDC, budget is discussed and according to financial requirement of each department, budget is allocated to it. The college generate funds from fees during admission. While collecting it college strictly sticks to the rules and regulations framed by the university and state government.

The college has an active Counselling Cell since 2010-2011. It has been established as per the directions of RTM Nagpur University for the welfare of the students. The purpose behind founding this cell is to provide psychological guidance and to empower girl students. Through the counselling cell teachers try to solve personal and emotional problems of the girl students. Counselling cell try to understand the difficulties and worries of the students and guides them accordingly. College has Mahila Takrar Niwaran Samiti, where students can approach and discuss the problems regarding gender based favouritism and pressures.

In the year 2014-15, Counselling Cell arranged the training programme of 'martial art' to empower the students for self-defence. It also helps in spiritual and physical development of human body. In the same session three days workshop was organised on "Empowerment of Girls to face the Social Challenges of 21st Century," It aimed at equipping girls to accept the challenges and should be able to protect themselves. Total 13 students participated in it. In this session elocution competition was also organised on 'Gender Equity to spread the awareness about it. In the session 2015-16, the programme 'Pori Jara Japun' by Dr. Vijaya Marotakar was arranged. She guided the students about the misuse of mobile phone and advised the future brides. She talked about the behaviour, dressing and values required in girls to face social challenges. Under 'Mahila Takrar Niwaran Samiti' many programmes were arranged to create gender sensitivity. It ensures the personal, social and academic counselling to the girl students. Mahila Takrar Niwaran Samiti consists of female teachers, doctor and lawyer as members. In the session 2016-17 various programmes were organised on 'Beti Bachao Beti padhao'. Under this banner poster competition on female foeticide was organised. Street Play was performed on the streets in Nagpur as well as in the NSS camp held in the village called Bahadura.
